Bulldog for Christ Service Program Overview and Requirements

Service education has been a hallmark of Catholic education in the United States for generations. It is an opportunity for students to live their faith and proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ and Catholic education.

All students at Blessed Sacrament Catholic School will be expected to complete an age-appropriate number of service education projects each semester. While service education projects will be a required and graded component of the school's curricular program, the greater purpose will be to help our students observe Christ's commandment to love our neighbors.

Each semester, students must complete one service education project for each of the Corporal Works of Mercy. In addition, students in Third Grade through Eighth Grade must serve as a greeter for two Masses at Blessed Sacrament Catholic Church. Please note that participating in the St. Vincent de Paul Food Drive (November) or 40 Cans for Lent cannot be used as service projects.

Parents are asked to encourage their children to complete their service education projects in a manner that is consistent with Christ's message of helping those less fortunate and most vulnerable in our society. At the same time, however, a student should perform their required service hours in a safe, structured environment under adult supervision.

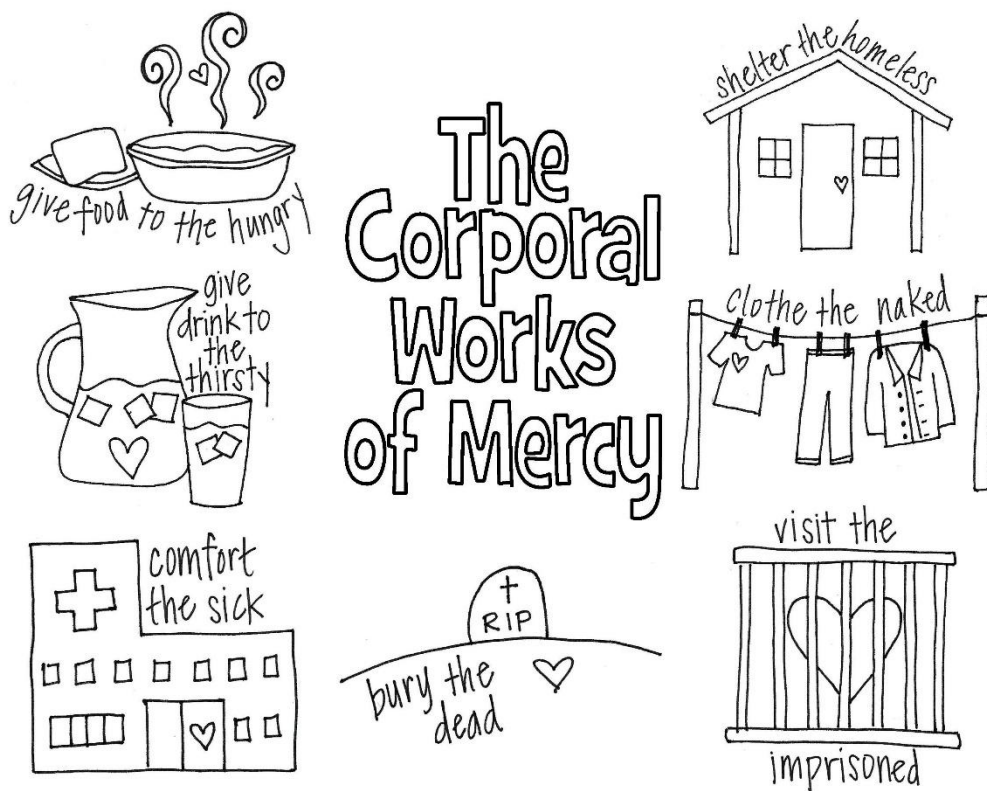
The Corporal Works of Mercy

The Works of Mercy are charitable deeds by which we help our neighbor. The Works of Mercy are divided into two categories – Corporal (Physical) and Spiritual Works.

The Corporal Works of Mercy include: Feeding the Hungry, Giving Drink to the Thirsty, Clothing the Naked, Sheltering the Homeless, Visiting the Sick and Imprisoned and Burying the Dead.

Mass Greeter at Blessed Sacrament Catholic School

Students must serve, in Mass uniform, as a greeter at Blessed Sacrament Catholic Church. Students in Third Grade through Eighth Grade must serve at two (2) masses each semester. A maximum of four greeters may serve at one Mass. Parents or students may sign-up in the School Office.



Early Childhood and Elementary Age-Appropriate Examples of Service Projects for Students



Giving Food to the Hungry

1. Make sandwiches for a local food bank or soup kitchen.
2. Create "blessing bags" with snacks to distribute to homeless individuals.
3. Bake cookies as a class to donate to a community center.
4. Organize a classroom "snack drive" for families in need.
5. Help prepare a meal at a parish or community soup kitchen.
6. Create care packages with non-perishable foods for neighbors.
7. Plant a classroom vegetable garden and donate the harvest.
8. Make peanut butter and jelly sandwiches for a homeless shelter.
9. Decorate paper bags for a food bank's holiday food drive.
10. Collect canned goods from families to donate to a food pantry.



Giving Drink to the Thirsty

1. Set up a "water station" for homeless or unhoused neighbors.
2. Make lemonade and give it away to homeless individuals or at a community center.
3. Collect water bottles to donate to a homeless shelter.
4. Create colorful water bottles and distribute them to those in need.
5. Organize a "hydration drive" collecting bottled water for donation.
6. Make and distribute cold beverages at a community event for homeless individuals.
7. Create care packages with water and juice boxes for families in need.
8. Decorate water bottles to give to a local shelter.
9. Collect sports drinks and water for a homeless outreach program.
10. Make homemade juice or smoothies to share with those experiencing homelessness.



Clothing the Naked

1. Collect gently used clothing for a local shelter or donation center.
2. Organize a "sock drive" to donate warm socks to homeless individuals.
3. Make blankets or collect blankets for a homeless shelter.
4. Decorate and fill "winter care packages" with hats, gloves, and scarves.
5. Create a classroom clothing swap to teach giving and sharing.
6. Donate outgrown winter coats to families in need.
7. Collect underwear and socks (often-needed but rarely donated items).
8. Make or collect blankets for animals at a shelter.
9. Organize a "coat drive" in fall/winter for those experiencing homelessness.
10. Decorate bags for a clothing donation drive.



Visiting the Imprisoned

1. Make care packages with allowed items for prisoners.
2. Create a "kindness jar" with messages to send to a prison ministry program.
3. Draw pictures or write letters to send through a prison pen-pal program.
4. Make bookmarks or journals for incarcerated individuals.
5. Create prayer cards to send to prisoners.
6. Make "encouragement packages" with inspirational quotes.
7. Draw pictures for children visiting incarcerated parents.
8. Create crafts to include in care packages for prisoners.
9. Write letters of encouragement to incarcerated individuals.
10. Pray a Rosary for those imprisoned.



Comforting the Sick

1. Make colorful get-well cards for hospitalized children or seniors
2. Create "comfort bags" with games, books, or activities for patients
3. Decorate paper flowers to brighten a hospital or nursing home
4. Make handmade bookmarks for patients in the hospital
5. Create cheerful posters to display in a children's hospital
6. Bake cookies or treats (if allowed) to share with hospital staff
7. Make friendship bracelets to give to sick children
8. Create a "smile jar" with funny jokes or encouraging messages
9. Draw pictures to send to homebound seniors in your community
10. Make origami crafts to brighten a patient's hospital room



Sheltering the Homeless

1. Collect supplies (blankets, pillows, toiletries) for a homeless shelter.
2. Make "blessing bags" with essential items for homeless individuals.
3. Create care packages with hygiene items for a shelter.
4. Donate blankets and pillows to a homeless outreach program.
5. Collect hotel-sized toiletries to donate to shelters.
6. Make handmade cards to include in care packages for shelter residents.
7. Organize a toy/book donation for children at a family shelter.
8. Collect backpacks and fill them with necessities for homeless youth.
9. Create "homeless care kits" with essential supplies.
10. Decorate storage bins to be filled with donations for shelters.



Burying the Dead

1. Create sympathy cards for families who have lost loved ones.
2. Make prayer cards or memorial bookmarks for grieving families.
3. Create a "memory jar" where people can share memories of the deceased.
4. Draw pictures or write letters to comfort grieving classmates.
5. Plant a tree or flowers in memory of someone who has passed.
6. Create a memorial bulletin board celebrating someone's life.
7. Make candles or light a candle in remembrance.
8. Create a "comfort care package" for grieving families.
9. Write encouraging messages for families experiencing loss.
10. Make handmade ornaments in memory of someone who has died.
